On the Snowline

There are murmurings of a revival in the Feral Venison industry, mainly to deal with the number of wild deer currently on private land. A few new processing plants are planned, plus several operators ramping up their food bank supplying operations.

But even with all the talk of the numbers of deer out there, is there enough to supply all these new operations economically for any length of time, I have my doubts!

There is one plant where the talk is they are planning to process 30,000 a year. That is processing more wild deer per year than any plant has to my knowledge since 1975/76 and the last of the boom years of Venison recovery. To achieve this, they would need to average around 125 a day, day in day out! But they are very unlikely to get the continuous supply of animals to achieve this. Rough weather will shut down helicopters. (Note how accidents to helicopters has gone down this century now that they pick the weather and conditions.) Mossburn plant then had chiller capacity to hold several days' supply of skin on carcases to help even out fluctuations even then we would run out. None of the current plants I have seen have that capacity, chillers cost money. Will farmers want helicopters around during the Roar when many either make money from or have their mate's trophy hunting? Note WAR operations are now out on Doc land during the Roar, Easter & Christmas. How long will commercial operators have social licence to operate during fawning? Farmers are unlikely to want helicopters around during lambing or calving either. Several operators are most likely each counting the same deer as ones they are going to harvest. The number of Deer available to harvest will also be affected by how far 1080 is spread.

So, to achieve 30,000 they need to perhaps look at processing at the rate of 200 per day when animals available. A rate the 1975 rebuilt Mossburn factory only achieved for one week during its life. (That was the week before Christmas 1976 were we did 1000 deer. Christmas eve was a Friday we finished at 7 pm I was going to my parents at Balclutha for Xmas day. I got to Gore at 8.30 pm and did my Xmas shopping by 9 pm, thanks to late Friday nights. The staff had two kegs of beer that they were shouted to drink. They did not get through one before going to sleep. We were back at it early the next week)

The price being offered for carcases is nowhere near as good as it was back in the boom days of venison recovery when helicopter running costs are considered, or staff wages. So, chasing deer as hard as they used to will not be viable. The casual ground shooter sales to the packing houses is out. Need to be a registered supplier (with the packing house) prior to hunting. In passing a lot of the rubbish supplied to game packing houses came from these casual suppliers, we should avoid such in the future.

Most venison is eaten in Germany & Europe during their Autumn. There will be some considerable capital tied up in the product if paid for when processed, until sold (September, November). Unless things have changed lately venison with for Germany, the common species Red & Fallow must be processed separately. And labelled, Red is "Hirsch" & Fallow goes by "Dam Wild" (note scientific name for Fallow is Dama Dama.) It is all lumped together on the NZ market. As most of you know there is a marked difference between Red & Fallow in taste. It is a lottery what you get served in NZ. In passing we are perhaps lucky that we don't have to ID the Lamb & Mutton we export as to sheep breed! To me Southdown is tops Romney but average. Though there is now some Identifying of Beef in NZ as to breed!

So, developments are going to be interesting, a reduction in numbers where recreational hunter access is restricted, by either actual access or the cost of access is needed. But we need balance not more boom & bust. The numbers

controlled, and sufficient breading stock left to maintain numbers for recreational hunting and a stable feral venison industry to maintain the control as needed. No more dreams (by some parties) that every time the industry booms the Deer will be shot out and be no more. So, they chuck out any sensible Ideas for stability in deer numbers for hunting both recreational & commercial. There was such a stability plan being developed in the early 1990's the next boom and a change in the Minister of Conservation scraped that. Deer are here to stay they need managed better.

Better Hunting education

The Game Animal Council has an online hunter training platform, Better Hunting. It is free to use for hunters and other backcountry users wanting to develop their hunting and outdoor skills.

Better Hunting can be used on a laptop, tablet or phone. Courses can also be accessed offline through the free mobile app. Just create an account and get learning. The platform saves your progress as you go so you can dip in and out as often as you like.

Go to the Better Hunting platform.

Available courses

The Better Hunting platform is made up of separate modules across different subject areas:

- Hunting Essentials includes New Zealand specific outdoor and hunter safety and skills with
 everything from weather forecasting, navigation, river crossing, first aid, preparation, access, game
 animal management and other bushcraft and hunting skills.
- **Firearms Essentials** is about learning safe and successful firearms use. This includes maintenance, sighting in, storage and transport, and technique.
- **Pig Hunting** is an introductory course to pig hunting in New Zealand, exploring important theory and dog handling techniques and how to get into practical training.
- Better Hunting also includes skill-building games, digital trip intentions, ballot calendars and more.


