**Editorial**

Christmas means a lot of things to a lot of people. Unfortunately for me it often means writing submissions on various changes that the government and its agencies propose. This year the list included Westland and Mt Cook national parks. One of the big concerns is the increasing visitor numbers and their effect on the environment.

It is proposed that all solid human waste not deposited in approved facilities be carried back out of the park by its producers. This Idea has some merit in the high use areas especially in relation to the deposits left next to roads by freedom campers. But is the solution for all deposits as in those left by climbers, trampers and hunters. While trampers and hunters are often able to bury any deposit is left when they are caught short. It is a bit more difficult for climbers. One would not want Mt Cook to become the mess that has been the fate of Everest.

How would hunters feel if the same standards are implemented in Fiordland and Stewart Island? Rubbish needs to be contained and eliminated. The environment is not a waste dump. I have just read a report of rubbish concerns at Lake Waikaremoana in the Urewera's.

Then there is the concerns currently being expressed about plastic (bags). The solution to the above problem may not be very desirable if it increases the use of plastic. Solving one problem is not ideal if it creates another. Faecal matter does decompose. But it must not be left to decompose where it is unsightly or cause health concerns.

How often do you come across a bottle a can or other long standing solid waste when hunting off the beaten track? How long has some of that been there? I have heard that some of the waste collected in some of the early beach clean ups was land filled in the back of some beaches, now to be exposed by erosion.

People's attitude to rubbish has to change not only out there past the black stump but in urban areas also. The amount of broken glass and other rubbish I see on our streets when out for that bike ride to maintain some fitness is shocking. Especially over weekends and holidays. The disposable society has to change.

The problem is obvious the solutions not so obvious, it is a work in progress the solutions need to vary depending on the situation. What may be needed and good at the top of Mt Cook may not be the best at a hunter's camp in the bush.

## Mason Bay Stewart Island Rat Trapping Summary 2018 year



Since 2006 Southland Branch NZDA has managed a rat trapping program at Homestead block on Mason Bay. We have 315 rat traps set over a series of lines. The aim of the project is to control the rat numbers to give the native birds their best chance of survival over the nesting/fledging period. We also set 14 cat traps.

The traps were all left set in December 2017. The first party check of the traps was in August 2018. They found exactly 100 rats had been caught. Strangely enough, a small number of rats have been recently caught and had not even begun to decompose. We think this is due to the cinnamon based lure we used.

This year all six parties made it safely to Homestead.

Total rats killed was 290 (100 between December 2017 – Aug 2018) The last three of our six parties could only average 14 rats or one rat every 300 trap nights so we must have been having some impact.

Total cats killed = 6

10 Cage traps were set for 37 nights.

4 kill traps were set for 61 nights.

A number of instances were observed where cats had stolen the bait. We will look at ways to prevent this happening. Most cats were around the woolshed/airstrip/Hunters line. Interestingly no cats were detected on Big Sandhill line.

Total deer killed = 9 (6 whitetails and 3 red deer.)

### Issues

One of the cat cages got lost (it became overgrown with vegetation – but has since been found). Another cage on the airstrip was shifted by a hunting party and took a time to locate. I will get a small sign made up for next year asking hunters not to move the cages.

Traps. This year we bought 10 plastic TR-SNAPR Snap-E® Rat Trap for a trial. One of them lost the catch that holds the spring and the general opinion is we stick with the wooden Victor traps. Gus Ronald has offered to paint new traps to get them to last longer. Over two thirds of the traps now have a roof over them. All have bird proof covers. We will prioritise getting the remainder covered. The chocolate bait goes mouldy between trips but still catches rats. Next season we will use what bait we have on hand and will purchase some GoodNature possum lure which the rats seem to really enjoy.

Good reports received from most parties regarding bird sightings. Although not a target species all parties reported large numbers of tuis on the blocks. Ie 40 & 50 plus sightings. It is a big year for fuchsia and flax flowers.

Funding thanks to DOC and especially Invercargill Hunting & Fishing store has meant that transport costs were taken care of. JD
